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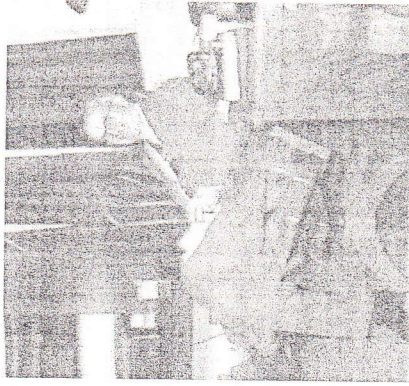

## The George A. Kopp Annual Endowed Memorial Lectures

George Adams Kopp was born on February 7, 1900 in Montgomery City, Missouri. He was a member of the U.S. armed forces during World War I. In 1923, Dr. Kopp attended Monmouth College and majored in chemistry and speech. He was class president and an activist on campus. After graduation, he became the Chair of the Speech Department at Jamestown College in North Dakota (1926-1928). He received his PhD in 1933 in Wisconsin. While conducting research for his dissertation, he formulated his organism theory of stuttering and his whole mind and body approach to problems of spoken communication.

In 1936, he came to Detroit to develop a program to prepare clinicians and public schools teachers of speech correction at Teachers' College, which later became Wayne State University. Dr. Kopp then spent a period of time on the faculty at the Teachers' College, Columbia, at the Bell Telephone Lab, and at the University of Michigan. He returned to Wayne State University from 1948 until his death in 1968. Dr. Kopp developed a cooperative clinic with the Detroit Public Schools, many hospitals, and private medical clinics. He was one of the founding members of the American Speech-Language and Hearing Association, and served as Executive Secretary Treasurer from 1948-1959. In 1959, he was elected president of ASHA.

Dr. Kopp was an extraordinary diagnostician and clinician. As a professor, he was supportive and perceptive of students' needs as they developed their own skills. He loved teaching, delighted in the successes of his students, and was indefatigable in his efforts on behalf of the faculty, program, and students.
