Susan Bristol, MPA 1981

2023 Distinguished Graduate Award Recipient



The 2023 Distinguished Graduate Award recipient is Susan Bristol, who has an extraordinary career in human resources management. She earned her master's degree in public administration from Wayne State University in 1981 and had previously earned a bachelor of arts in political science, also from Wayne State.

Her career began as an intern with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, where she worked on a special team developing surveys to gather data about client attitudes about new department systems. She also worked as a research analyst for the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments. Later, she worked as a research analyst for Harper Hospital, with her focus on human resources and employment statistics.

Ms. Bristol has dedicated 26 years of her career to the Detroit Medical Center, holding a prominent role as the Director of Human Resource Information Systems. In this capacity, she worked on process redesign, system selection, and implementation, and data retrieval and analysis. Her leadership was instrumental in managing successful teams, overseeing major projects, and developing budget proposals. Furthermore, she managed the HR department through numerous changes and developed new HR information systems in response to the evolving technology and HR practices.

Since 2017, Susan has actively served as a board member of the Wayne County Conservation District, an organization committed to preserving the county's natural resources. Her commitment to public service led her to become the board chair in 2020, relishing the opportunity to serve the public. This position has also provided invaluable experience working in the public eye and building meaningful relationships.

For current MPA students, Susan offers a piece of invaluable advice: keep an open mind as to what you will use the degree for. With various opportunities open to MPA graduates, she recommends students to "expect the unexpected and be open to all opportunities available." Susan believes that statistics and data analysis are some of the most important skills for her career and is grateful for the knowledge she gained in these areas through the MPA program. Ms. Susan Bristol's inspiring career trajectory serves as a testament to the diverse avenues an MPA degree can unlock.

Alumnus Steve Townsend Endows Two Scholarships for MPA Program

MPA Alumnus Steve Townsend ('02) has always wanted to give back to the program. He started by establishing the MPA Annual Scholarship in 2017 and then added the MPA Annual Recruitment Scholarship in 2020. Both scholarships are available to students who are working full-time while pursuing their MPA degree. The scholarships have played a crucial role in attracting exceptional candidates to the program, enabling students to pursue their degrees with less financial stress and to finish their degrees faster with less debt.

Steve, who currently serves as the Director of Marketing and Communications for Wayne State's Medical School, said that the reason he chose to focus on students who are working full-time while in the program is twofold. He feels that a program like the MPA gains great value from having in-service who are able to bring their experience and input to the classroom. "I got a lot out of the program, even beyond what I learned in the classroom. I learned so much from my fellow classmates. In a program like the MPA, so much of it is learning the material but also learning how it works in the real world," Steve said. He also worked full-time while completing his MPA, so he understands the struggle to balance work commitments with school.

As a result of these scholarships, the program has been able to welcome a multitude of talented individuals who may have otherwise chosen alternative paths due to financial challenges. Many of the scholarship recipients have gone on to assume important roles in both the public and private sectors, making impactful contributions to society.

The scholarships were previously funded by Steve's annual donations to the program, but he has now decided to endow both MPA scholarships. This extraordinary decision allows the program to support MPA students in perpetuity, supporting generation after generation of students. Steve's vision and commitment will ensure that the program continues to attract and nurture talented individuals who will contribute to the betterment of society through their public service and leadership.

The scholarships are a generous gift from both Steve and his wife, Dr. Amy Neville. Amy is a 2002 graduate of the Wayne State School of Medicine. Once fully endowed, the scholarships will be called the Neville-Townsend Endowed Master of Public Administration Scholarship and the Neville-Townsend Endowed Master of Public Administration Recruitment Scholarship, both available to current and incoming MPA students who are working full-time.

MPA Program Partners with the Office of International Programs for the 2023 Mandela Washington Fellowship Program

The Office of International Programs at Wayne State University was again chosen as a host university for the Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders. Over the summer, Wayne State hosted 25 of Africa's bright, emerging Public Management leaders for a six-week Leadership Institute, sponsored by the U.S. Department of State. The U.S. Government's Young African Leaders Initiative was created in 2010 and supports young Africans as they spur economic growth and prosperity, strengthen democratic governance, and enhance peace and security across Africa. Since 2014, the U.S. Department of State has supported nearly 5,800 Mandela Washington Fellows from across Sub-Saharan Africa to develop their leadership skills and foster connections and collaboration with U.S. professionals. The cohort of fellows hosted by Wayne State will be part of a group of 700 Mandela Washington Fellows hosted at 28 educational institutions across the United States.



Our MPA program played an integral providing an academic curriculum in public management for the Fellowship Program. Notably, Dr. Brady Baybeck served as the academic director. Other MPA and political science faculty who participated in the program were Professors Kristin Taylor, Ron Brown, Sharon Lean, and Michelle Wooddell. MPA alumna Dana Gill (MPA, '18) also led a session. Additionally, alums from the MA/Ph.D. programs with public affairs backgrounds participated: Esmat Ishag-Osman, Calvin Higgins and Ari Ruttenberg.

Several MPA alumni served as coaches, working one-on-one with the fellows during their time in the program. The coaches were: Dominique Blanks (MPA '17), Courtney Flynn (MPA '16), Elizabeth King (MPA '17), Jenny Mahn (MPA '15), Tim Michling (MPA '15), and Richard Pineau (MPA '16).

The Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders was indeed a great opportunity and experience for our MPA program and alumni. The MPA program looks forward to partnering with the Office of International Programs for the fellowship program next year!


Jeremy Johnson is from Flint, Michigan, and graduated from Oakland University with a BA in Political Science. He is looking forward to the MPA program at WSU!




Amanda Reed (MPA '16) started a new career journey as a Program Manager at the Michigan Health Endowment Fund.

Program Faculty Activities



Associate Professor Brady Baybeck has had a busy summer. In June and July, he served as academic director for the Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders on campus. He built upon the great work of the previous academic director, putting together a noncredit curriculum that exposed the Fellows to the wonders and complexities of the public management environment in the United States, in Michigan, and in the Detroit Metropolitan area. He also continued his work with the National Association of County Collectors, Treasurers, and Finance Officers (NACCTFO), putting together an noncredit program in public administration for the membership at their Annual Conference in Austin, Texas. He is also still serving as Interim Coordinator for the Graduate Certificate in Nonprofit Management & Leadership and is looking forward to (re)assuming the role of the MPA Director in the Fall semester and again building upon the great work of his predecessor.

Associate Professor Kyu-Nahm Jun contributed to a co-authored book chapter, entitled "Public Value Contestation in the Era of Fiscal Austerity and Crisis" in the edited volume Challenges to Public Value Creation: Authority, Process, and Complexity. She has also started a new research project, "Are We in This Together? Exploring Inequality-Driven Mistrust and Compliance with COVID-19 Preventive Measures," which received funding through the 2023 Social Sciences Research Support Program at Wayne. The Levin Center for Oversight and Democracy was established in 2015 to advance former Senator Carl Levin's legacy of bipartisan, evidence-based legislative oversight. In her role as Academic Director of the State Oversight Academy, Dr. Sarbaugh-Thompson focuses on legislative oversight of state agencies and oversight of state contracts. As part of her work with the State Oversight Academy, Dr. Sarbaugh-Thompson completed two major reports on state legislative oversight: one of oversight in the 50 states, and one on six states' efforts to improve the oversight of state agency contracts Dr. Sarbaugh-Thompson also contributed a chapter on Michigan's first experience drawing district maps with an independent citizen redistricting commission, created in 2018 through a citizen ballot initiative. The chapter, entitled "The Maiden Voyage of Michigan's Redistricting Commission," will appear in The Roads to Congress 2022, to be published soon by Palgrave Macmillan.



Associate Professor John Strate has accepted an offer from CLAS to retire Fall semester of 2024, with teaching responsibilities ending Fall semester of 2023. He first came to WSU, the Department of Political Science, and the MPA program in the Spring-Summer semester of 1984. He has taught the core courses PS 5630, Statistics and Data Analysis I, PS 7460, Program Evaluation, and PS 7480, Policy Analysis for Administration, along with eight other undergraduate and graduate level courses. In 2000 the Chairperson at the time, Richard Elling, appointed him as MPA Director, a position that he held for about seven years.

During his years as Director, MPA faculty members introduced changes to the curriculum that have remained in place to the present day. The MPA program was the first in Michigan to receive NASPAA accreditation. Since his arrival, all MPA directors have led successful efforts to achieve reaccreditation. The most recent successful effort was led by Kyu-Nahm Jun who has done a excellent job as Director. MPA faculty members have served as chairpersons for dozens of Ph.D. students in the fields of public administration and public policy, and have been very productive scholars, publishing regularly. A few have secured multiple and large research grants. As is true of all MPA faculty and staff, the most lasting reward of our careers is seeing our MPA graduates go on to successful public service careers. He is confident that current MPA students can look forward to receiving the highest quality public service education.



Associate Professor Kristin Taylor received an academic recognition award. She was awarded the Career Development Chair which are given to as many as 10 recently tenured faculty as part of the university's program to support the teaching and research endeavors of faculty members in the developmental stages of their scholarly careers. She also coauthored "Policy Entrepreneurs and Individuals: Influence and Behavior in Pandemic Response," published in Public Administration Review and "Visual Policy Narrative Messaging Improves COVID-19 Vaccine Uptake," published in PNAS Nexus.



Professor Lyke Thompson is the Director for the Center for Urban Studies. In this role, he works closely with community organizations and local governments to evaluate programs, study key policy questions, and test interventions. This year Dr. Thompson and the Center have initiated two new programs regarding climate change, one to help residents adapt to the increase in flooding in Detroit and the other a collaboration with WSU Engineering faculty to simulate and then assess ways that utilities might adapt to weather events that have led to flooding and power or water outages related to climate change.

Dr. Byung Hee (Brian) Min joins Wayne State from Valdosta State University, where he served as an assistant professor in the Department of Political Science. Dr. Min earned his Ph.D. from the Askew School of Public Administration and Policy at Florida State University. He also completed his B.A. in Public Administration from Michigan State University, and his master's degree in Sociology at Yonsei University in South Korea.

His expertise lies in the areas of public and nonprofit management, public budgeting and finance, organizational behavior and theory, and government-nonprofit collaboration.

His research has appeared in journals such as Administration and Society, Public Performance & Management Review, Nonprofit Management and Leadership, and the Journal of Public Affairs Education. Dr. Min's scholarly work and commitment to diversity and inclusion have earned him several prestigious national awards, including the 2021 Emerging Scholar Award by the Association for Research on Nonprofit Organizations and Voluntary Action (ARNOVA), the 2020 Founder's Fellow by the American Society for Public Administration (ASPA), the Best Thesis Grant from Florida State University, a Diversity Scholar Award by ARNOVA, and the Best Paper Award for the 2020 ASPA SKPA Junior Asian Scholarship.
